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Quilt As You Go Poinsettia & Accent Quilt Blocks



Quilt As You Go is by far the easiest way to create a quilt block. It is done entirely in hoop and also has an easy to remove stitching line around the block, making it easier to put together using the Quilt As You Go method. There are a lot of lessons on the web how to put together a quilt using the Quilt As You Go method. The Quilt As You Go Quilt Blocks have been designed to work

with this method of putting together of putting a quilt together. You will probably find the two most used methods of putting a quilt together. The first is to put it together with sashing on the other is without sashing. Both look great. The Accent Blocks are the blocks that can go between the ones with the roses. You can make any size quilt. Just stitch out as many blocks as you want. The Accent blocks match the rose embroidered ones, and are also stitched out the same way as the rose blocks.

What you get in your download file:

The Poinsettia blocks for the 5"x5", 6"x6", "7"x7" and 8"x8" hoop (Please check the dimensions of the designs in the colorchart to make sure they fit the embroidery area of your hoop)

The Accent blocks for the 5"x5", 6"x6", "7"x7" and 8"x8" hoop (Please check the dimensions of the designs in the colorchart to make sure they fit the embroidery area of your hoop)

Colorcharts and this tutorial along with our basic instructions on the Quilt As You Go technique to get you started.



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Materials:

Cutaway stabilizer

Thin Batting

Cotton Fabric

**Temporary Adhesive
Spray Glue**

Embroidery Thread

Printout of Design



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Lets get started on making these blocks. Hoop a piece of cutaway stabilizer. Load the design onto your machine. Stitch the first color. This marks where to put the batting and fabric onto the stabilizer. Cut a piece of batting and fabric 2" bigger than the size block you are stitching out. Eg if you are stitching the 5"x5" block then your fabric and batting will be 7"x7" each. Spray the stabilizer with temporary adhesive spray and place the batting over the stitched line. Spray the batting with temporary adhesive spray and place the fabric onto the batting. Stitch the rest of the design until there are 2 color changes left.



Remove the hoop from the machine. Turn it over so the backside of the hoop faces up. Spray the stabilizer with temporary adhesive spray. Put a piece of cotton fabric onto the stabilizer so it covers the embroidered area. This piece of fabric should be the same size as you cut the top fabric. Put the hoop back into the machine and stitch the last colorstop.



And that's it. Block is done. Nice and Easy!!!
